New Working Paper Series

The Institute for Regulatory Policy Studies has always worked to maintain an objective, non-biased educational and research program. To achieve this goal, the Institute has begun an ambitious new program of research led by graduate students in the Master's Degree Program. The second working paper by the Institute's graduate research associates is titled "Barriers to Adoption of Renewable Energy Technology," by Jeremiah Doner. In the Abstract, Jeremiah states, "Increased use of renewable energy is one of several promising strategies for reducing emissions of pollutants and for hedging against the

volatility of fossil fuel prices. Among the available options for encouraging the development of renewable energy technology are the Production Tax Credit, Renewable Portfolio Standard, and Research and Development subsidies.

This paper also examines the international and United States experience with renewables and what policy structures were implemented. In addition, the paper discusses how the diffusion rate of new technologies such as renewables can be increased with certain policy mechanisms. The main objective of this paper is to iden-

tify and describe the correct policy design measures that might be used by regulatory bodies to guide the continued growth of renewable energy technologies."

Illinois Broadband Mapping Project

In June, 2006, the Institute received a grant from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity to develop the first state-wide map of broadband services. Working in conjunction with Lieutenant Governor Pat Quinn's Illinois Broadband Deployment Council, the Institute fielded two surveys to request information. The first survey was sent to local government officials to obtain a comprehensive list of broadband providers in the state. The second survey was sent to broadband providers to request information about the services that they provide and where they provide those services in the State of Illinois.

The objective of this study is to determine the availability of various broadband options at the five digit zip code level throughout the state of Illinois. According to the results of the first phase of the study, the availability of broadband service varies widely by zip

code, but in a somewhat predictable manner. By and large, there are more providers in zip codes with higher median income and population density and those also tend to be more urban.

Based on the data and other information we collected, as many as 718 of the 1,348 zip codes in Illinois have access to only a single provider of broadband service. These zip codes collectively account for 15.4 percent of the state's total population. At the other extreme, people residing in 5 zip codes, accounting for 0.71 percent of the state's total population, have access to 6 or more broadband service providers. Finally, prices for broadband service range between \$15 and \$50 per month, depending on the speed of the service and other factors (e.g., whether the broadband service is part of a bundle of services purchased from the provider).

Detailed maps of Illinois displaying the number of providers and associated demographic and economic information are contained in the report. The purpose of this study is to provide data and analysis to enable policymakers them to develop strategies to enhance broadband availability to un-served or under-served areas. The Institute is now in preparation for Phase II of the Broadband Study.




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
